Argument Analysis: Appeals to compassion

Compassion is a powerful emotion that writers play on when writing persuasively.

When appealing to compassion, a writer may draw on a range of other techniques to evoke a sense of empathy concern in their readers. Imagery, for example, may be used to evoke concern. A rhetorical question could encourage readers to ponder the misfortune of others. An anecdote might be used to elicit sympathy.

Although appeals to compassion can take various forms, the intention is to manipulate the emotions of a reader, to illustrate distress or suffering endured by those close to an issue, and ultimately build support for a particular point of view.

According to North and West Homelessness Networks, there are over 24,000 homeless people in Victoria. In a city with skyrocketing house prices and exorbitant rent, it's little wonder that families doing it tough fall between the cracks.

Homelessness affects more Australians than ever before. According to Anglicare, only 6% of rental properties are affordable for low income earners. Only about 1% of those living on the aged pension can afford to pay rent. In 2018, the ABC reported the heartbreaking story of a sixty year old woman forced to live

in her car when she could no longer keep up with her bills. It's a story that's becoming all too common. Factors including poverty, domestic violence and mental health mean more and more vulnerable Aussies are denied the dignity of roof over their heads.

What is most distressing is that we are more than capable of solving this problem. The federal government simply needs to invest more money in crisis accommodation and public housing. While their annual investment of \$1.7 billion might seem impressive, that's a drop in the bucket compared to the \$14 billion clawed back by greedy property investors every year.

Australians are a generous bunch who pride themselves on decency and a fair go. It's about time we extended that spirit of generosity to those who need it most.
